LEAD-IN


- 1. in a 60 minute lesson a lead in should be about 5 minutes max;
- 2. the aim of the lead in is to set the context of the lesson;
- 3. a lead-in shouldn't focus on specific vocabulary (target language) the purpose here is just to get students engaged in the topic.

It works because:

- 1. it's interesting
- 2. it's invigorating
- 3. it's contextualized
- 4. it creates a need for what you're teaching
- 5. it provides immediate positive feedback
- 6. it takes the pressure off. Here we can see the example of lead in.

CCQ (Concept Checking questions)

When it comes to teaching, concept checking questions (CCQs) play a crucial role in ensuring that students have a clear understanding of the material being taught.

plan CCQs in advance

mask at least 3 CCQs

the most efficient CCQs are yes/no questions, either/or questions, simple Wh- questions along with true/false statements.

Here are three concept checking questions (CCQs) to check your understanding of the word 'couch potato':






